

The 6th Years celebrated their Graduation Mass on May 16th, as they leave us and prepare for their Leaving Certificate exams. I would like to take this opportunity to offer the Class of 2019 my very best wishes for their state examinations. I have no doubt that their hard work will be rewarded in August when they receive their results.

The academic year comes to a close with news that one of our past pupils, Fiachra Kelleher (Class of 2016) has been named a Trinity Scholar in English, one of the most prestigious undergraduate scholarships in these islands. In the USA, another past pupil, Seán Jenkins, has received a full NCAA Division 1 scholarship in basketball to Presbyterian College in South Carolina. The school would like to offer warmest congratulations to both young men on their recent successes. The school was delighted this past week to welcome past pupil, Dan Cowhie, back to Pres, after a long absence. Dan is Pres' oldest living graduate at the tender age of 97, and has lived in Dublin for most of his life. He was determined to retrace his Cork roots and in particular, his Pres connection. His incredible energy and memory was very apparent as he regaled us with stories from his time in Pres in the 1930s.

The staff and students have worked very well this year and I wish to thank them for all of their efforts. The teachers have been very successful in implementing the new strategies for the Junior Cycle and the pupils will reap the benefits of this hard work in the years to come.

On the sporting front, the SCT reached the Senior Cup final but unfortunately lost out narrowly on the day to old rivals CBC. Special thanks must go to all the players, coaches and parents who put in such a huge effort and sacrifice over the season. The supporters gave great uplifting support in all of the cup matches throughout the year. We thank them also.

The school had a world record to celebrate recently in rowing through 4th Year students, Jimmy Coughlan and Luke O'Keeffe, a fantastic achievement for the boys and well done to them and their coaches. Our sailors won both the Munster and All-Ireland Schools titles for the third year in a row. The Irish U18 Schools rugby team in the Six Nations Festival was captained by 5th Year student, Alex Kendellen, a great honour for Alex, his family and the school. The school also had three past pupils involved in the Ireland U20 Grand Slam winning squad and we congratulate Seán French, Jonathan Wren and Billy Scannell on their success.

Our soccer teams have done very well this year, with the U19s reaching a Munster final and with two Cork Cup finals at U19 and U15 level up for grabs in the coming weeks.

Scifest 2019

In September, we began our project in the Scientific Investigation module. Every Tuesday for the first two classes, we'd work on the project with the aim of entering it in a Scifest@School competition. Scifest@School is the in-school section of the national Scifest competition. Projects from within the school compete together and external judges come in to judge the projects. There are prizes for the best presentation and for the overall winner and runner-up.

Over a weekend, by sheer coincidence, both of us watched the same YouTube video on the effects of vaping on the human lungs. It was an unscientific experiment, but it got us thinking. As vaping is such a controversial topic, we decided to conduct an experiment to discover whether vaping was harmful to humans. At the same time, in Biology, we were covering daphnia pulix, a small 'water flea' which is used in LC50 tests. Lethal Concentration 50 tests are a common method of determining the concentration at which a chemical is lethal to humans. A sample concentration is prepared at different concentrations, and the daphnia are put in it. Once 50% of the daphnia are dead, the substance is deemed toxic. Using maths, this level can also be applied to humans.

We decided to attempt to find the LC50 for vape liquid. With the help of Ms Claire Lynch, Ms Karen Wall and Mr Enda O'Regan. We ordered daphnia and conducted our first experiment, where we dosed the daphnia with various concentrations of vape liquid. This experiment was very successful and gave us an idea of what the exact level of concentration should be. Our next test was slightly different. Using special equipment, we passed the aerosol from the vape pen through an exact volume of water. We calculated the ratio of aerosol that the average ex-smoker would inhale over a 24 hour period to the average air inhaled over the

same period, and used this concentration on the daphnia. The specimens were then left for 24 hours in the Junior Science lab. The results were very interesting. We noticed that despite the absence of nicotine in the vape liquid, several of the specimens had died. We also noted a colour change and a drastic change in behaviour.

We were ready for the Scifes@School competition in February. All the projects that entered were very interesting, well presented, and the competition was tight. Thankfully in the end, our project took home the first place rosette!

We entered the Scifest@College competition in CIT in April. The standard here was even higher. There were many amazing projects from all over Munster. It was a total shock to us when our names were called out as overall winners of the competition. Mr Enda O'Regan also won the 'Best Teacher of a Biology Project' prize as well.

After the shock had begun to wear off a bit, Ms Sheila Porter, the CEO of Scifest told us our project would automatically be entered in the National Final in November. The overall winners of the National Final receive an all-expenses-paid trip along with their teacher to represent Ireland at the Intel International Science and Engineering Fair (ISEF) which is held annually in May in Anaheim, California. We are now hard at work preparing and hope to do well in November.

The whole experience was incredible, and the help that this knowledge will give us for the Leaving Cert and beyond is priceless. We would like to sincerely thank everybody who helped our project from the all teachers in the PBC Science Dept, to the students who did the Scientific Investigations module with us and helped to troubleshoot the project.

Historically, PBC Debating Society has had one of the proudest debating traditions in the city. However, in recent years this had waned. I, along with the other senior students, decided to set out to change this by holding after school classes for our teams on the Art of Argumentation. Peer Mentoring has been a feature of school life in Pres since 2007, arising out of research done for the Health Promoting School Project, where consultations with the Parents Council, staff and the Student Council flagged the transition to secondary school as traumatic for some of our students.

We started with a programme that involved input from a social worker and a group of counsellors, and it has grown substantially over the past few years. Themes are set for each session where the 6th Year Peer Mentors meet their group of 8-10 1st Years to settle them, and endeavour to teach them what it means to be a 'Pres Boy'.

In the early years, our former Principal Mr Declan Healy, always met with the Peer Mentors to help train them in. Declan was marvellous in this role, having being associated with the school for so long as a student himself, and the long and valuable teaching and management years he gave to Pres.

The outgoing 6th Year Peer Mentors had their final session of the year on Thursday 2nd May, where they began the training of our incoming 5th Year Peer Mentors who take on the mantle for next year.

This training continues with a formal Leadership training day on Friday 10th May, with Br Martin Kenneally, our former Principal, and now head of the Leaf Foundation for Leadership.

Our week ended with a concert, sharing and showcasing music, song, poetry and art work, involving a group of students from 1st to 5th Year.

Thank you to all the students and staff who greatly supported and participated in our Arts Week. There is a wealth of creative ability and talent in our school. Very well done to everyone for a very successful and enjoyable week.







Paul Healy (Class of 2001)

Entering Pres as a 'furry' in 1995, Paul had either the 'advantage' or 'disadvantage' of being the son of legendary Pres Accounting and Business teacher, Fergus 'Gussie' Healy. Thankfully, he did not let that intimidate him and he quickly immersed himself in all aspects of Pres life, being joined by his younger brothers, Kevin and Alan, in subsequent years. He excelled as a rugby winger for the 1998 Junior Cup team controversially beaten by St Munchins in Musgrave Park, was a Bowen Shield finalist in 1999, a year he also toured South Africa with the school. Kieran entered Pres in 2006, which was the start of an enjoyable six year journey in learning, people and sport. On the 10th April 2019, 1st Year students partook in a charity 7-A-Side soccer tournament benefitting the charity 'Dogs for the Disabled Cork'.



Like Moses who spent 40 years leading his people to the promised land, Gussy has spent exactly a year longer guiding and mentoring students during his accomplished tenure with us. He has touched all of our lives during this time, and we are very sad to see him go. Gussy has carried the tradition of the Pres ethos with him from his early days as both a student and teacher in our sister school, Coláiste Chríost Rí.

Gus always knew his students as people, and as a teacher the man was a perfectionist in delivering his subject.

Gussy, through many extra-curricular activities strived to help his students be successful away from the classroom too. Even at the end of a long teaching day, he would volunteer his time to stay after school to coach many a successful tennis team, as the numerous photographs on the walls of the school corridors are testament to. He also coached many rugby teams and has stated often that a certain Declan Kidney was once his understudy! He was superb at organising the buses for all school activities, especially on the many school tours he participated in to Russia, Spain, South Africa and Argentina amongst others.

Gussy has been an amazing teacher, but he is also a great colleague and friend. If you were ever at school late and needed someone to help you brainstorm teaching ideas, Gussy was there for you. He has been our 'go-to' person when we have had questions or needed ideas. Heck, after 41 years of teaching you better have some knowledge to share! When I think of Gussy, I'm reminded of the following quotation by John Steinbeck 'I have come to believe that a great teacher is a great artist, and that there are as few as there are any other great artists. Teaching might even be the greatest of the arts since the medium is the human mind and spirit!'

Gus, you are one of the great artists of the teaching profession. You have made a lasting impression on the world by enriching the lives of the students you have taught. Thank you so much and I wish you a very happy retirement!

The outdoor cricket season began in earnest on May 10th last, against pre- tournament favourites, Cork Combined Schools at a pristine Mardyke ground in glorious summer weather. 

Ireland U19 Basketball International David Murray wins CIT Sports Star Award


